Could It Happen Here! How Well Are You Trained to Respond to Fires?

Here are some things you can do to prevent fire from occurring or to make sure it is handled safely and correctly.		
Fire Prevention and Planning		Responding to Fire
V	Understand possible fire scenarios then know how to report a fire	 Always sound a fire alarm before fighting a fire
V	Check bonding and ground wires to prevent static ignition when handling	 Call for help and make sure it is coming before fighting a fire
_	flammables liquids or combustible dusts {PSID members see incident 422}	 Fight fires only if you have been trained to do so
V	Know your emergency routes, locations of emergency shelters and rally points	Make sure you leave a safe unobstructed path for retreat when fighting a fire
V	Take fire extinguisher training, yearly if possible	 Stop, Drop and Roll" if your clothing or hair catches fire.
	Different classes of fires (rubbish, flammables/combustibles, electrical or metals) require different extinguishing materials. Make sure you have the right fire fighting equipment for all potential fires	 Make contingency plans and train on handling and disposing of hazardous materials after a fire has occurred, including medical response to hazardous exposures
