Perhaps some of the clan are wondering what's behind all this. For the benefit of those who have not had occasion to chat with me lately (I was intro duced as "money bags" at the last meeting), I give to you this terse explaination: MONEY!

As was reported at our first meeting of the season, our estimated 1957-1958 budget indicated that the Chicago Section would operate at a loss of about \$660.00. Chairman Alford promptly gave instructions to put "Operation Thrift" into effect. The word went out to all officers and committeemen, "CUT COSTS!" Shortly afterwards Operation Thrift went into high gear. Although the season is only half over, the results of this economy drive look quite encouraging.

Nevertheless, it still looks like red ink will dominate our ledger this year. I am sorry to say that part of this is due to the reluctance of some members to pay their dues. As of this writing, our paid membership is 430 - considerably short of last year's all-time high of 574. We can still break this record if we try. Once again we appeal to those who have not paid their dues to do so NOW.

By the time you read this, our Board of Directors will have met to discuss the all-important problem of what to do about dues next year. Without a doubt, the dues will have to be raised. The question is: how much? They have been at the present level for many years, but are no longer realistic.

As with everything else today, our costs have gone up. So has our membership, but not in the same proportion. We are indeed, a "non-profit organization. The Board's recommendation for a dues increase will be passed on to you in the not-too-distant future.

INSTRUMENTS AND CONTROL ENGINEERING COURSES

In cooperation with the Chicago Section-Instrument Society of America, two courses in Instruments and Control Engineering are being offered by the University of Illinois (Extension Division) at Navy Pier.

The courses are presented from a general viewpoint and are designed for the instrument technician, the process engineer, the instrument engineer or anyone whose work is fringing on or heading for these fields. The courses may be taken either simultaneously or in either sequence. They provide an excellent orientation for planning further specialized study in areas such as electronics, hydraulics, computers, analytical instruments, etc.

Covers the many aspects of control systems planning, including classification and diagrammatic representation of open loop and closed loop (feed back) control.
