

Afterdinner Program, "Opportunities and Problems Under the U.S.-U.S.S.R. Joint Agreement for Cooperation and Scientific Exchange."

Speaker, Dr. Arthur E. Humphrey

Professor Humphrey obtained his B.S. and M.S. in chemical engineering from the University of Idaho, in 1948 and 1950, and his Ph.D. in chemical engineering from Columbia University in 1953. He also received an M.S. in Food Technology from M.I.T. in 1960. He has been associated with the University of Pennsylvania since 1953, and has specialized in the engineering aspects of fermentation processes. Professor Humphrey has received numerous awards, among them: University of Pennsylvania Teaching Award 1959, Professional Progress Award AIChE 1973, D.F. Katz Lectureship Award, U. of Michigan 1973, National Academy of Engineering Membership 1973.

Abstract: President Nixon on his trip to Russia signed an Agreement for Cooperation and Scientific Exchange in six basic areas. The speaker was chairman of the U.S. contingent of a Joint Working Group for one area, "The Production of Substances by Microbial Means." This involved visits and negotiations both in Russia and the U.S. over the last nine months. The talk will outline the goals and expectations of the exchange program and speculate on the problems in achieving a meaningful agreement in a period of great political disenchantment with science (e.g. the elimination of the Office of Science and Technology, the availability of minuscule funds for supporting scientific programs) at a time of great political stress.

Location: The meeting will be at the Ramada Inn, 300 S. Frontage Rd. in Burr Ridge. To get there, take I-55, and exit southbound at the Cook DuPage County Line Road. The Ramada Inn is right there. (Editor's note: my studies of a map of the area suggest that people coming on the Tri-State Tollway, I-294, should get onto I-55 westbound, and that they will find the Cook DuPage County Line Rd. exit comes along immediately.)

<u>Dues Increased</u>: The Chicago Section Board reluctantly decided that, in spite of our record high membership of over 1100, we must pay \$5 a year in dues (instead of \$4) if the Section is to stop losing money. The dues year is from January to December.

You Never Miss the Water 'Til the Well Runs Dry: The Board also voted to place a one year moratorium on the One-Day Symposium, held for the past several years in the spring. Reasons include the difficulty of attracting speakers and company support, and high costs. This action will be reviewed next year; the possibility of reinstating the One-Day Symposium remains open, provided there is substantial demand for it.

Energy and Ecology Committee: This committee was formed in a burst of enthusiasm a couple of years ago. Its primary purpose was conceived to be providing speakers for community groups, luncheon meetings, and other gatherings interested in hearing a chemical engineer speak about energy and ecology.
