Cane Land Distillery Tour



Cane Land Distilling Company, LLC was founded in 2013 by Walter Tharp, whose family owns Alma Plantation & Sugar Mill in Lakeland, Louisiana.

Tharp hatched the idea of opening a distillery while attending a party at a wedding of the owners of the famed rum company, Ron Zacapa in Guatemala. Other owners of sugar mills from Guatemala and El Salvador were in attendance at the wedding gala. One common question emerged from conversations with those sugar mill owners. "You have a sugar mill and you don't make rum? Why not?"

Tharp's initial thought was, "Just because we make sugar doesn't mean we make candy bars." Reflecting on the conversation on the flight back to the States, the idea for a Louisiana distillery was already in motion. Having such a vast agricultural resource as Alma, it made perfect sense.

Years of red tape ensued. Everything from pesky laws from the Prohibition Era that are still on the books, to challenges from federal, state and local authorities, made the journey difficult. But Tharp persevered.

Today, Cane Land Distilling Company is in full production in very rare company. Owning the farmland on Alma, the sugar mill and the distillery allows for complete control of the production and distilling process. This results in one of the country's only estate bottled producers of spirits and rhum agricole in the continental U.S.

Recap of the November Meeting



The November meeting took place at Ralph & Kacoo's. The food was excellent and so was the presentation by Rachel Wiggens. She gave us an overview of Process Safety Management, from Hazard and Operability Analyses, Process Hazard Analyses, and conducting Levels of Protection Analyses and Safety Integrity Level. She explained how process safety deals with catastrophic events causing many deaths and injuries rather than with isolated personal injuries. She explained the qualitative risk analysis matrix in which events are plotted by their frequency or probability of occurrence versus the seriousness of their consequence. Increasing the safety integrity level by using redundant or more reliable instruments can reduce the frequency of the incidents and consequently their risk level. She made a brief introduction of her organization, LOOP (Louisiana Offshore Oil Port), which operates at three locations. At the main location, they can store up to 11 million barrels of oil in tanks and over 60 million barrels in salt domes. The port unloads oil from supertankers and pump it through pipelines all over the United States.

At the meeting, some of the officers for 2018 were elected. Donna Bryant will move to Chair, Vishal Vora was elected Vice Chair, Chelsea Bourdon will continue as Secretary, Jimmy Orr as Treasurer, and Noel Ricord as member of the Executive Committee.

Narses Barona, Ph.D. (1932-2017)

Dr. Barona, a Fellow of AIChE, passed away peacefully on November 12. A native of Cali Colombia he worked for Ethyl Corporation (Albemarle) for 33 years and taught a senior course in chemical engineering at LSU. He conducted research and is the author of several publications and patents. He was a dear friend. We express our deepest condolences to Luz Marina, his wife of 59 years, and to the rest of his family.
