Barry J. Schoch, P.E. is a Senior Vice President at KCI Technologies. In this role, he is responsible for leading the firm's business development efforts and engineering operations for highway, bridge and traffic projects in Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware, and Washington, D.C.

With a career spanning more than three decades, Barry has made significant contributions to Pennsylvania's infrastructure, in both the private and public sectors. As former Secretary of the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation, he oversaw the development and implementation of several of the state's largest transportation initiatives, including the agency's first public-private partnership contract—a major rehabilitation effort of more than 500 structurally deficient bridges. During his tenure, he also guided efforts to pass Act 89, a \$2.4 billion annual increase in transportation funding.

Barry earned his bachelor's degree in civil engineering from the Pennsylvania State University and is a registered professional engineer in seven states. He is active in numerous professional associations, most recently completing a two-year term on the ASCE Industry Leadership Council. In recent years, Schoch served as president of the PHIA and chaired transportation committees for the ACEC/PA. He is a long-time member of the ASCE and ASHE. His accolades include the ASHE Robert E. Pearson Person of the Year Award, PSATS Founders Award, PHIA Advocate of the Year Award, Greater Valley Forge Transportation Management Association Leadership Award, and Engineers Society of Western Pennsylvania William Metcalf Award.
