### **About the Fellows Council**

The Fellows Council was constituted in January 2011. The By-laws were revised and approved in August 2016. The leadership cycle covers three years. During a one-year term, the Chair of the Council moderates Fellow gatherings, usually breakfasts, at the AIChE Spring and Annual meetings, and coordinates the Council's activities to advance the mission of AIChE. The Council Vice Chair assists the Chair in arranging meetings and records during a one-year term and becomes the next Chair. The Past Chair serves for one year to provide officer continuity and leads in nominating new Council members. The Secretary serves for three years and provides reports of the meetings of the Fellows Council, edits the Newsletter, and oversees communications to the Council members. The Council meets quarterly: physically at the AIChE Spring and Annual meetings and virtually in between.

Any Fellow of the Institute, or group of Fellows, may make proposals and suggest issues of Fellow concern to the Council. These shall be submitted in writing/e-mail to any Council member, and if appropriate, such items will be included in the agenda of the next quarterly Council meeting.

# **Focus on Education**



### Regional meetings for university ChE Department Chairs:

These are continuing to be supported by the Fellows Council. The goal is to create and support recurring gatherings for Chairs to discuss their collective needs and interests with their peers. In all cases, the regional department chairs set the Agenda, choose dates and locations. AIChE and the Fellows Council support these efforts.

The <u>Southeast</u> Region (covering the Southeast Student Region with several states added), has held a successful, well-attended Department Chairs/Heads Meeting for over 50 years. The 2019 event, organized by J. Weidner (weidner@engr.sc.edu) and will be held <u>June 2-4, 2019</u> at Amelia Island, FL. The agenda will be posted on the Fellows Website, when available. Due to the popularity of this event, Weidner indicates only limited space is available space for Chairs from outside the Southeast.

The <u>Southwest</u> Region (the Southwest Central, Mountain and Pacific Student Regions) will meet for the second time during June 12-14 in Phoenix, AZ. C. Torres (cit@asu.edu) is the contact. The agenda will be posted on the Fellows Website, when available. The goal is to have 25+ Chairs in attendance; space is available for additional participants.

The first meeting of an expanded Northeast Region (NE US and Eastern Canada, including NE and Mid Atlantic Student Regions) is being organized for June 2020. Planning is being done by J. Klier (U. Mass, Amherst), E. Maginn (Notre Dame), J. Plawsky (RPI), A. Robinson (CMU), V. Young (Ohio U.), and Fellows Council Vice Chair D. Eckhardt. ## **Accreditation Board for Engineering & Technology (ABET)**

ABET (<u>www.abet.org</u>/) is a nonprofit, non-governmental organization for <u>accrediting college and university degree programs</u> in applied/natural science, computing, engineering, and engineering technology. AIChE works with ABET to accredit Chemical Engineering programs.



ABET currently has a draft proposal for <u>new chemical engineering program criteria</u>. Comments are currently being accepted. (<u>www.abet.org/accreditation/accreditation-criteria/accreditation-changes/</u>). Final revisions are expected in November 2019 and, if approved, will apply beginning in 2020-2021.

ABET has a continuing <u>need for Chemical Engineering Program Evaluators</u>, particularly those with industrial experience. AIChE Fellows typically make excellent Program Evaluators

New Program Evaluators are expected to have significant experience in Chemical Engineering, complete ABET training, and make at least a five-year commitment. ### **Focus on Diversity and Inclusiveness**

Henry T. Brown Scholarship Endowment: It is with great sadness we report the passing of Melinda C. Brown, Henry T. Brown's wife and partner of sixty years. They have been pioneering advocates and mentors to underrepresented communities in AIChE for nearly five decades. In memory of Melinda's supporting role to Henry's work for minority engineers at AIChE, the Endowment for the Minority Affairs Committee (MAC) Scholarship Program has been renamed "The Henry T. Brown and Melinda C. Brown Endowment for the Education of Under-Represented Minority Chemical Engineers." So far, MAC scholarships have been presented to more than 450 high school and college students. The goal of Brown Endowment is \$300k of which \$186k has been raised. ### **Focus on AIChE Fellows Generosity**

*Giving to the AIChE Foundation's Doing a World of Good campaign*: The Doing a World of Good campaign has raised \$11MM, with <u>AIChE Fellows contributing \$1.2 MM</u>. AIChE has supported 174 grants to under-represented students, 60 grants to impactful projects, educated 389 faculty members on process safety, and helped 416 universities implement the Undergraduate Process Safety Learning Initiative.



# AICHE Design Institute for Physical Property Research (DIPPR®)

DIPPR<sup>®</sup> (<u>www.aiche.org/dippr</u>) has been active longer than any other sponsored research group of AIChE, celebrating its 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary last November. It is now recognized as the world's premier pre-competitive cooperative to measure and tabulate thermophysical properties and related Environmental Health & Safety data for successful process design. Fellow Jo Rogers is Operations Manager of DIPPR.

DIPPR's Gold Standard Methodology ensures that new data are critically evaluated before acceptance, with values accompanied by estimates of their underlying uncertainties. AIChE provides the umbrella for DIPPR's research activities and has dissemination, publication, and sales rights to the results of such work. All 49 DIPPR member companies participate in the 801 Project: Evaluated Process Design Data (<a href="https://www.aiche.org/dippr/projects/801">https://www.aiche.org/dippr/projects/801</a>) for accurate, and complete thermodynamic & physical property process engineering data. The costs of projects are covered by DIPPR dues and income from licensing.

### Benefits include:

Exclusive use of new DIPPR data for at least five years until they are made available through licensing. A voice in the annual selection of new compounds to be added to the DIPPR database.

Leveraging of scarce resources through collaboration with industry peers.

Benchmarked practices and networking with industry experts dealing with relevant data needs.

Major past projects of DIPPR are listed below. Their research results have been included in Project 801.

- 805 Project: Experimental Data on Mixtures (<a href="www.aiche.org/dippr/projects/805">www.aiche.org/dippr/projects/805</a>) to obtain phase equilibrium and other data on binary and multicomponent mixtures of industrial chemicals augmenting group structure predictive techniques. More than 315 systems have been measured.
- 851 Project: Critical Properties of Pure Compounds (<u>www.aiche.org/dippr/projects/851</u>) to experimentally measure, especially with new, rapid techniques to avoid the effects of degradation and gravity. Values of  $T_c$  for 183 chemicals, along with many  $P_c$  and  $V_c$  data have been measured.
- ESP Project: Environmental and Safety Properties (<u>www.aiche.org/dippr/projects/ESP</u>) to compile and evaluate data and estimates. This unique project fills ESP knowledge gaps of U.S. industry.

### Summary of Fellows Council Meeting in Pittsburgh October 30, 2018

The AIChE Fellows Council oversees the organized activities of the Fellows and meets at least four times per year to discuss Fellow activities and policies. Two meetings are face-to-face at the fall (Annual) and spring (National) AIChE meetings, and two or more are virtual, usually by teleconference.

At the Pittsburgh meeting after the Fellows Breakfast on October 30, 2018, most of the 2018 and 2019 members attended and were joined by several guest Fellows providing stimulating discussions.

### The main topics were:

- (1) Feedback of Breakfast; Positives, possible improvements, suggestions
- (2) PAIC task force to review content of policy statements; revisions to policies (See *aiche.org/paic*)
- (3) Strategic Initiatives and Programming: Fellows cosponsored two Annual Meeting sessions
- (4) Educational support for ChE University Departments: FC representation at Department Chairs session. Continuing and new regional Department Chairs meetings well-regarded (See page 5.)
- (5) SIOC: Fellows cosponsored one Student Conference session. Engineers without Borders support is changing. FC to do more on international activities, diversity, MAC Scholarships, mentoring.
- (6) Minority Affairs Committee (MAC): strategic planning to move beyond meetings to build community, establish business plan as contributions decline, connect to AIChE Strategic Plan.
- (7) Foundation: Financials doing well, but Doing a World of Good goal not yet met, seeking more employer matching contributions
- (8) Admissions: 10 years as member can cause problems especially for internationals. AIChE Bylaws may need revising. Committee doing test cases to facilitate Fellow nominations and selection. FC should submit more nominations.
- (9) Website/Newsletter: Site updating in process. Newsletter informative & enjoyable. Items welcome!
- (10) New Fellow pins: Four designs proposed by AIChE Marketing. Choice needed in early 2019; to be made at next meeting.
- (11) Next telecom in January followed by face-to-face in New Orleans, April 2, 2019.
